Submitted Candidate Statements for the 2021 AFT Local 2373 Election

Candidate for President

Joseph Basso



Joseph Basso has served as president of AFT Local 2373 for eight years. He previously held the position of Grievance Chair/Conflict Resolution Chair of Local 2373 for eight years. A full professor in the Department of Public Relations and Advertising, Dr. Basso has a Ph.D. from Texas A&M University and a Juris Doctorate from Widener University School of Law. He is admitted to the Bar in both New Jersey and Pennsylvania. During his time as president of AFT Local 2373, Dr. Basso has served on the Executive Committee of the Council of New Jersey State College Locals. He has represented Rowan University AFT on the last two statewide contract negotiations.

Locally, Dr. Basso has negotiated an agreement to create a Lecturer Line Position at Rowan that provided job stability and benefits for approximately 150 non-tenure track instructors. Furthermore, he negotiated an early retirement incentive program with Rowan's administrative for faculty and staff with a minimum of 20 years of service to receive compensation for early retirement. He continues to negotiate a local agreement for a pathway to promotion for professional staff and mid-career faculty members.

Candidate for Vice President IIMichael DiSanto



My name is **Michael DiSanto** and I am a Tenured Full Professor and Elected Chair of the Department of Biomedical Sciences (BMS) at Cooper Medical School of Rowan University (CMSRU). I am **running for Vice-President 2** of AFT Local 2373 and am sincerely asking for your vote.

I have been a consistent attendee of Local AFT 2373 General Union Meetings since 2013. I was elected as a Delegate to the Council of New Jersey State College Locals, AFT, AFL-CIO in 2015 and again in 2017 and then in 2019 was elected Vice-President 2 of the AFT 2373. Therefore, by virtue of our constitution, I have served as a member of the Executive Board of Rowan Local 2373 from 2015 – present. During this time I have attended virtually every local Rowan General AFT meeting, Rowan Executive Board AFT meeting and NJ State Council meeting. I also had the honor of attending the National AFT meeting in Pittsburgh in the summer of 2018 with my Rowan colleagues. During this time I have become very familiar with the problems now facing Unions nationally and many of the issues facing faculty and professional staff throughout NJ and within the Rowan system. As a faculty member at CMSRU I saw the profound effects that poorly defined work duties and failure to follow rules can have on the overall morale of a school. Faculty and staff at Rowan want only to be spending their time contributing to building a highly regarded reputation for our University rather than constantly trying to force Administration to follow the written rules. Major issues that I have worked on improving include unclear criteria for promotion and tenure that can become a moving target, promotion and tenure letters from Administration being synchronized rather than written as independent judgements and research infrastructure and purchasing not working as effectively as it should - yet expectations for research to achieve tenure appearing to rise. I have also been a driving force in trying to get in-unit work returned to Department Chairs and a uniform compensation of Department Chairs across the school which I feel we are now making very good progress on. Along with our President Joe Basso and VP-1 Jerry Hough I now join monthly meetings with Provost Lowman and other Administrators and I feel we are all now beginning to work as a team. I have a long background in academics at multiple institutions and experience in the pharmaceutical industry which I can apply to serve as an effective Vice-President 2. Over these last few years I have learned much about the needs of the Rowan Glassboro Faculty and Professional Staff and can bring a fresh perspective from within the Rowan system. Finally, my initial 1.5 years as VP-2 was highly consumed by COVID-19 and its effects on our Union members. I worked hard striving to make sure employees were protected the best that they could be including their personal health and their employment. I do feel that the MOA we signed to protect the jobs of our fellow employees was the right thing to do and am working with Karen Siefriing (Vice-President of our NJ State Council) to do our best to make employees that had to take furlough days and lost money as whole as possible. I provide a short biography of myself below. I was one of CMSRU's first biomedical science faculty members. I was appointed Associate Professor of Biomedical Sciences and Surgery and Director of Urology Research at CMSRU

in 2011. At the medical school I serve as co-director for the M2 Uro-Renal course and am also involved in teaching the M1 Fundamentals course. Simultaneously I have been a cofacilitator for both active learning groups and a scholar's workshop groups and a member of a dozen or so committees (some at the main campus) and the CMSRU Admissions Committee, Phase-1 Committee and Curriculum Committee. I am also President of the CMSRU Faculty Assembly and work closely with Bill Freind to synch this Assembly with the Rowan Senate. I received my MS and PhD from Drexel in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology and then spent a couple years at Wyeth Ayerst Pharmaceutical Company in Princeton, NJ. I then moved to the University of Pennsylvania where I obtained my first faculty position as an Assistant Professor and then later moved to the Albert Einstein College of Medicine of Yeshiva University in Bronx, NY, where I became Director of Urology Research and was promoted to Associate Professor. I became a Full Professor and was tenured at CMSRU in 2017. I was also elected Chair of the BMS Department in January of 2017 and re-elected in September of 2020. Unfortunately it took almost 3 years to be recognized as the duly elected Chair of the Biomedical Sciences Department at CMSRU. This recognition required a grievance and an Unfair Labor Practice proceeding at PERC. Although frustrating and an unwanted diversion from my academic work, through all of this I have learned a lot about what was wrong with the system and feel I am doing my best to make it better for all parties including Chairs at the Rowan Glassboro Campus. In summary I feel that my skill set and experience in many different areas will allow me to help our Union lead the way to transitioning Rowan to a smoothly functioning, well integrated, large research institute with an even higher national and international recognition. Both of my children have attended Rowan University giving me yet another important reason to help Rowan become the best it can be. I look forward to serving everyone and anyone and challenging the status quo.

Candidate for Treasurer Robert Sacchetta

Greetings Colleagues, my name is **Lori Brucker Block** and I am seeking your support as I run for **Conflict Resolution Chair** for our local #2373. I have been an active member of the

local AFT for 29 years. In that time period I have held numerous leadership positions, assisted in the negotiations of agreements, represented the local at the state, regional and national level as well as organized many different campaigns on and off campus.

In the fall of 2019; I was charged with organizing rallies and outreach regarding the status of our local not having a contract. In September of 2019, I organized a rally on the front steps of the Student Center featuring speakers and music to "rally the troops" and publicly let administration know that working without a contract is NOT equitable. Later, I organized with other locals in the state a DAY OF ACTION, where from Savitz Hall our union members signed a petition board and demonstrated that we were tired of working without a contract. (We received much state press regarding that demonstration.) I also was involved /participated in a silent protest when Governor Murphy spoke on campus in the Student Center. I am an organizer, participant and leader in fighting injustices impacting our union members.

In my 29 year tenure of being a member of local #2373 I have held numerous leadership positions:

- · I have served as the Professional Staff Chair I for two terms and have assisted in writing and negotiating agreements, most notably the Professional Staff Comp Time Agreement. Also as Chair, I was heavily involved in grievance proceedings under mentorship of Dr. Francis Johnson. In addition, I scheduled semester meetings for the entire professional staff. Under my direction, the professional staff unit for the first time held informational meetings regarding securing Professional Development Grants. I assisted in facilitating the first Professional Staff Orientations alongside Kate Boland.
- · I have served as Professional Staff Chair II for two terms assisting in meeting coordination, grievances, negotiations, and peer review.
- · I was elected to the Vice Presidency II of our local twice; at which time I along with the AFT leadership met with Ali Houshmand, Jim Newell and Bob Zazzali on a monthly basis in which we discussed issues on campus.
- \cdot I have served on the Tenure and Recontracting Committee for 6 years and served as its Chairperson.

Candidate for Adjunct Coordinator

Edward Kazarian



I am running for re-election to the post of Adjunct Coordinator I, which I have held since July of 2018.

This election is taking place at a crucial juncture for Rowan—and for public institutions of Higher Education in New Jersey and nationally. The Covid-19 crisis has destabilized institutional finances and forced changes in instructional modalities. Moreover, Rowan's administration has clearly signaled a desire to continue and even extend plans to move

further into online education, even after the campus fully reopens. These circumstances will have significant implications for everyone who works at Rowan—and union leadership will be facing significant challenges as a result. But it is also the case that adjunct faculty have been and will continue to be impacted in ways specific to their situation, and they need representation that appreciates these differences and will make sure they are attended to.

I started at Rowan as an adjunct professor of philosophy in the Fall of 2001, and I have been teaching here continuously since 2003. I have also taught as an adjunct at Drexel, Temple, and Villanova, where I did my Ph.D. Since 2018, I have been a Lecturer in the department of Philosophy and World Religions.

I was recruited to join AFT Local 2373 as a full member back in the early 2000s by Paul Ragozin, who was the adjunct coordinator at the time. In 2014, became the Philosophy and Religion Studies department representative to the local. In 2017, I was asked to become a local delegate to the Council of New Jersey State College Locals (CNJSCL) and AFTNJ. Taking on these roles, I also began to attend Local Executive Committee meetings. I was a vocal advocate for adjunct faculty in these various bodies—often one of the few people in the room with significant experience as an adjunct. It was as a result of this advocacy that, when the Adjunct Coordinator position became vacant, I was asked by the local president, Joe Basso, to step in and fill the remainder of the departing coordinator's term. I agreed because, like Joe, I felt that it was of crucial importance for adjunct faculty to have a dedicated representative on the local executive, and also that there be an officer whose primary responsibility was to serve the adjunct faculty unit.

Since taking up the position, my principal focus has been threefold. First, I have sought to ensure that adjunct faculty are well represented, both in the union and in the union's dealings with the University. Second, I have sought to ensure that the adjunct faculty understand how the union can help them, that they are aware of their rights under the contract, and that those rights are fulfilled. Finally, I have sought to increase union membership and participation among members of the adjunct faculty unit.

In the service of those aims, I have devoted some energy to gathering information about the the unit and its membership, including conducting a survey of the unit. I have also committed to disseminating information about issues and developments that affect adjunct faculty, both in person and electronically. I have also been a member of the negotiating team for the most recent master agreement between CNJSCL and the State Colleges and Universities, advocating a strong negotiating stance and ambitious goals. Those negotiations produced a contract agreement that includes very substantial increases in pay and will restore parity between senior adjunct and the basic full time faculty overload rate

per credit-hour. More recently, I have begun the process of creating an organizing and advisory committee to help ensure that the local is well-positioned to recognize and respond to the needs of our adjunct members. I hope to grow this institution to include representatives from every department where adjuncts are working, and to use it as a springboard to develop our organization among the adjunct faculty as we emerge from the Covid-19 crisis and begin to anticipate another round of contract negotiations.

As you can see, I have a significant track record of effectively filling the role of Adjunct Coordinator 1, and I have plans for how to respond in that role to the challenges that face the adjunct membership of our union going forward. I appreciate your confidence and support.
